PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to recognize the significant contributions of farming/ranching families in the County of Minburn who have continuously owned and actively farmed the same land for 100 years or more.

POLICY STATEMENT

County of Minburn Council shall present the prestigious "100 Year Agricultural Award" to eligible families who have farmed or ranched in the County for 100 years or longer, and who continue to farm.

DEFINITIONS

- 1. "Council" means the duly elected Council members of the County of Minburn No. 27
- 2. "County" means the municipality of the County of Minburn No. 27 having jurisdiction under the municipality of the *Municipal Government Act.*
- 3. "Homestead" means the residence of a person or family which comprises its home, land and surrounding property.
- 4. "Commodities" means a primary agricultural product that may be bought or sold
- 5. "100" Year Agricultural Award" refers to the award presented to those farm families who have farmed, and continue to farm, in the County of Minburn for 100 years or longer.

POLICY GUIDELINES

In order to effectively recognize the significant contributions pioneer farming families have made to the County:

- 1. The family must have continuously owned and actively operated the same land for 100 years or more.
- 2. Have a family member still actively farming the land.
- 3. The land must still be producing agricultural commodities by the owner.

Page 1 of 2

- 4. The family or individual nominating the farm/ranch family must submit an application/nomination form available on the County's website at www.minburncounty.ab.ca
- 5. The homestead establishment date must be provided.
- 6. Historical documentation must be provided, where possible, to show ownership and support homestead establishment date.

PROCEDURE

- 1. The Agricultural & Utilities Foreman will review the application.
- 2. Administration staff will obtain and verify homestead and current land titles as supporting documentation and verification of ownership.
- 3. To mark the significant milestone, presentation of the "100 Year Agricultural Award" will be completed by whom and where is mutually agreed upon by the Agricultural Service Board/Council.

A BYLAW OF THE COUNCIL OF THE COUNTY OF MINBURN NO. 27, VEGREVILLE, IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA TO AUTHORIZE A SPECIAL TAX BYLAW FOR THE 2023 TAXATION YEAR AGAINST PARCELS OF LAND IN THE HAMLET OF MINBURN TO RAISE REVENUE TO PAY FOR SEWER SERVICES.

WHEREAS, Section 382 of the *Municipal Government Act*, Revised Statutes of Alberta, 2000, Chapter M-26, authorizes a municipality to pass a special tax bylaw annually to raise revenue to pay for a specific service or purpose by imposing a special tax, including a sewer tax; and

WHEREAS, the Council of the County of Minburn No. 27 has prepared and adopted detailed estimates of the municipal revenues and expenditures as required at the Council meeting held on April 17, 2023 and

WHEREAS, the Council of the County of Minburn has adopted the 2023 Budget approving the estimated expenditure of \$22,582.80 for sewer services in the Hamlet of Minburn; and

WHEREAS, it is deemed to be just and equitable to set a special tax for the 2023 taxation year that will collect an equal amount of \$418.20 from each non-exempt parcel of land within the Hamlet of Minburn sufficient to raise \$22,582.80 in total.

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the County of Minburn No. 27, in the Province of Alberta, duly assembled, hereby enacts as follows:

- 1. This Bylaw may be cited as the "2023 Hamlet of Minburn Special Tax Rate Bylaw".
- 2. That the Chief Administrative Officer is authorized to levy a special tax in the amount of \$418.20 per parcel on non-exempt land shown on the assessment roll of the Hamlet of Minburn for the 2023 taxation year.
- 3. That the special taxes included in this Bylaw shall be levied and collected in the same manner and at the same time as general municipal taxes.
- 4. The special tax imposed by this Bylaw is for the specific purpose of raising revenue to fund the costs of sewer services in the Hamlet of Minburn which are estimated at \$22,582.80 for 2023.
- 5. This Bylaw comes into force on the date of the third and final reading passed in Council with unanimous consent of the members present the 17th day of April 2023.






It was great speaking with you. Below I have added in information on the contract, permits, future development and the removal of the signs.

For each of my signs, I make a 5-year minimum contract. This allows me to make enough return on the sign to cover the cost of building, installing and if need be removing the sign.

If the County does develop the land we can remove the signs after the contract. The big thing about the placement of the signs is to make it so that they are in areas that will not disrupt future developments. If they end up being in an area needing to be developed they can be removed at the end of the contract or we will work something thing out if the signs need to be removed earlier than the 5 years. Placing the signs in the corners of the section allows for the best opportunity to not have to remove the signs if future developments happen.

If the county is to sell the property. The signs allow the new owner to have passive income. This creates a property that not only can be farmed or developed but also is making constant income every six months.

I will be applying for the permits with the Town of Vegreville and Alberta Transportation. The only thing I will need once our contract is signed is to have the County of Minburn sign the "sign development permit" and the "landowner authorization letter".

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1. Summary

Forbes Bros has been contracted by FortisAlberta to engineer, design and construct a new distribution powerline within Minburn County. The powerline is planned to run North/South along RR 82. TWP Rd 480 is the North end of the powerline and TWP Rd 474 is the South end. The side of RR 82 that the powerline is planned to be built is on the East side.

During initial site visits and after reviewing Cadastral data, it was noted that there was an unusual 15m and 20m road widening taken across Buffalo Creek (see Appendix B). Typical alignments for constructing distribution powerlines have been 0.6m on municipal road allowance from the property line. Following this standard would result in an unusual alignment along this section.

The existing fence line built through this section is built on the former property line, consistent with a 66ft road allowance





FBL contracted Challenger Geomatics to survey the existing road surface within the road allowance. Data attached in Appendix B.

After reviewing the data and the site, FBL has 3 options for construction, outlined below.

2. Option 1

Fortis power line to be built 0.6m on the east side of 66 ft road right of way.

Structures to be located min.

9m from center of road

The most cost effective.

No deflections

All tangent structures

Construction access from the road

No specialized construction equipment needed to build.

Operation access from road to operate and maintain.

Ground conditions are good.

Cons

Does not follow the Minburn County policy

Does not consider for potential future road widening

3. Option 2

Fortis Power line to be located greater then the 66 ft road right of way and follow the property lines.

Pros

Follows Minburn County policy

Does consider for potential future road widening

Cons

Minimum of 4 deflections structures.

Ground conditions are now poor soils (soft, swampy, wet)

Specialized structures needed in these soil conditions (culverts, muskeg framing)

Specialized construction equipment needed to build (nod-well and swamp mats)

Reduced operations access for maintenance and restoration

4. Option 3

Orient the powerline to the maintain appropriate clearance from centerline of the road and road shoulder.

Pros



Follows the intent of Minburn County policies to provide safe clearance for traffic from utility infrastructure.

Cons

May interfere with future roadwork

May still require specialized structures for soil conditions

May still require specialized equipment for construction



Title: Utilities Within County Road Allowances Supersedes Policy Number: PDS 4

Policy Number: PDS 7004-01-A Next Review Date: 2024

Resolution No: 82-20

POLICY STATEMENT

The County of Minburn is committed to ensure all Utilities installed within any of the County's road rights-of-way do not cause damage to any of the County's infrastructure nor impede the safe operation of the road right-of-way.

PURPOSE

To define the minimum requirements for the installation of Utilities within the road right-of-way boundary of any public road under the direction, control, and management of the County of Minburn.

SCOPE

This policy applies to all utility companies.

POLICY PRINCIPLES

- 1. Utilities must be installed within utility rights-of-way adjacent to municipal road allowances wherever possible. Pipelines running parallel to the road cannot be installed within the County's road rights-of-way.
- 2. Utilities that are proposed to be installed within or adjacent to municipal road allowances require the approval of the County prior to installation.
- 3. Where Utility rights-of-way adjacent to a municipal road allowance is unattainable, the County may grant approval for the placement of such Utilities within the municipal road allowance.
- 4. Electrical utilities shall be located no further than 0.6 m (2.0 ft.) from the boundary of the road allowance <u>and</u> shall be located no closer than 9.0 m (29.5 ft.) from the center of the road.

- 5. Written requests for approval along with plans for all proposed Utilities within the municipal road allowance shall be submitted by the Company to the County of Minburn No. 27 at least thirty (30) days prior to the proposed construction/installation date.
- 6. In addition to the construction plans and 3D drawings identifying the location of the proposed Utilities in relation to the municipal road (including setbacks), the Company shall provide the County with shape files of the proposed Utilities for use in the County's GIS system.
- 7. The Company must restore all ground disturbances or damage that occurs as the result of the installation and placement of the Utility in municipal road allowances to pre-existing or better conditions to the satisfaction of the County.
- 8. The placement of any Utility in municipal road allowances must not result in the disturbance of any driving surface or road infrastructure without the prior approval of the County.
- 9. The Company shall be liable to the County for all losses, costs, damages and expenses whatsoever which the County may suffer, sustain, pay or incur.
- 10. The Company, its successors and assigns shall indemnify and save harmless the County of and from any and all losses, costs, charges, liabilities, damages and expenses (including without limiting the generality of the foregoing any and all liabilities to third parties, whether in contract, tort, or otherwise) which the Company at any time or times hereafter shall or may bear, suffer, sustain or incur for or by reason of the Company, its successors or assigns use of the road allowance area or by reason of the negligence of the Company, its successors and assigns servants, agents, employees or contractors.
- 11. Neither party shall be held responsible for damages or other losses caused by delay or failure to perform the provisions of this Policy where such delay or failure is directly or indirectly caused by or results from events beyond the control of either party. These events shall include fire, flood, earthquake, accident, civil disturbances, war, rationing, embargoes, strikes or labour stoppages, acts of God, or acts of government.
- 12. Should relocation, locating or protection of the Utility be required by the County in the future, with no other alternative being identified, the Company, its successors or assigns agree to relocate, locate, or protect the Utility within the existing right of way with all reasonable costs relative thereto being borne by the Company, its successors or assigns. The County shall provide written notice to the Company, its successors or assigns at least sixty (60) days prior to the relocation, locating, or protecting being required.

EXEMPTIONS:

1. Council may exempt a road from this policy by a resolution of Council.

DEFINITIONS

- 1. 'Company' means the utility company
- 2. 'Council' means the duly elected Council of the County of Minburn No. 27
- 3. 'County' means the County of Minburn No. 27





Agriculture Services Board Update

Grading of Seed samples at the Seed Cleaning Plants is 50% complete.

- The contract for Roadside Mowing has been signed with A&R Contracting.
- We received the Alberta Seed Processors Fusarium Surveillance 2023
 Interim Report. The report shows that of all seed submitted in 2022 in
 the County of Minburn, 31 to 40% of all samples submitted were positive
 for Fusarium. Which tied us for third highest in the Province with the
 County of Lethbridge. Wainwright and Vermilion River came in first and
 second respectively for positive samples. However, levels of severity
 were quite low at 0.3% infection levels.
- Our Summer students have all been hired and will be starting May 1.
- Brush mulching completed in March includes RR141 just north of 631, RRd's 142,143,151,152,154,160, all south of TWP Rd 534 and TWP Rd 520 and 161. Mulcher is now in Division #6 and will continue until road conditions no longer support brushing.
- Our 2022 Plant Disease Survey results from 2022 are now out. In Canola, Blackleg had the highest severity at 37% incidence and a .9 on a scale of five for severity. Clubroot was found in only 5 of 12 fields at an incidence rate of 5.5% and a severity rating of .23 on a scale of 0 to 3.
 So extremely low. On a scale of 0-9, Leaf Spot Severity in cereals ran 3.86.

Regional Waste Transfer Station

- All parties have signed the new five-year Waste Haul Contract with the Two Hills Regional Waste Management Authority.
- With support from the Village of Mannville, we will change hours at the Mannville transfer site on Wednesdays to accommodate users working during day-time hours. The new hours will be 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. The new hours will come into effect on May 1 and be trialed until August.



Thank you for sending B&A notice of this project on March 6, 2023. B&A is the land use planning consultant for TC Energy (TC) in Western Canada. On behalf of TC, we work with municipalities and stakeholders regarding land use and development surrounding their pipeline infrastructure to ensure that it occurs in a safe and successful manner.

As per the requirements of the Canada Energy Regulator (CER), additional development in proximity to TC's pipelines with potential new residents, employees, structures, ground disturbance, and crossings could warrant pipeline remediation. Consultation between TC and the applicant prior to development assists both parties in determining the best course of action to proceed with potential remediation and development. This is to crossings and pipeline damage, unwarranted crossings, and identify development within proximity to the pipeline that may trigger a pipeline Class upgrade.

Description of Proposed MDP

We understand that the purpose of the Municipal Development Plan (MDP) is to outline the future land uses for the County of Minburn No. 27 and to provide guidelines for the form and type of developments in the County.

Please refer to **Attachment 01 Approximate Location of TC Infrastructure** for maps that show the proposal in relation to the approximate location of TC's infrastructure.

Assessment of Proposed MDP

As demonstrated in **Attachment 01 Approximate Location of TC Infrastructure**, TC Energy pipelines are located within the County of Minburn No. 27.

The MDP was reviewed, and does not appear to contain any statements or policies related to development in proximity of pipeline infrastructure. Therefore, TC would recommend inclusion of the maps, statements and policies detailed in the recommendations section below.







Recommendations

The following are requested as conditions at this time and should be incorporated into the City's MDP where noted. Please note that additional comments may arise as necessary:

- 1. In subdivisions, TC Energy's right-of-way shall be dedicated to the municipality as passive open space or parkland subject to TC Energy's easement rights. TC Energy's right-of-way shall be identified on all municipal plans and schedules as a pipeline/utility corridor.
- 2. A crossing and encroachment permit/agreement must be approved by TC Energy for ongoing activities such as mowing or maintenance of the right-of-way on public lands.
- 3. The conditions, restrictions or covenants specified by TC Energy shall be registered against title in relation to subdivisions by way of application to register conditions, restrictions, or covenants, as applicable, pursuant to the Land Titles Act, or any amendments thereto.

In addition, a Draft Condition by the Municipality that requires a **Subdivision Agreement** shall ensure the following matters are included:

- No buildings or structures shall be installed anywhere on TC Energy's right-of-way.
 Permanent buildings and structures are to be located a minimum of 7 metres from the edge
 of the right-of-way or 12 metres from the pipeline, whichever is greater. Temporary or
 accessory buildings are to be located a minimum of 3 metres from the edge of the right-ofway.
- 2. A minimum setback of 7 metres from the nearest portion of a TC Energy pipeline right-of-way shall also apply to any parking area or loading area, including any parking spaces, loading spaces, stacking spaces, bicycle parking spaces, and any associated vehicular travelled surface (e.g. drive aisle, driveway, access road). This 7-metre setback shall also apply to any grading or pondworks associated with stormwater management facilities.
- 3. Written Consent must be obtained from TC Energy prior to undertaking the following activities:
 - Constructing of installing a facility across, on, along or under a TC Energy right-ofway. A facility may include, but is not limited to: driveways, roads, access ramps, trails, pathways, utilities, berms, fences/fence posts;
 - Conducting a ground disturbance (excavation or digging) on TC Energy's right-of-way or within 30 metres of the centreline of TC Energy's pipeline (the "Prescribed Area");
 - Driving a vehicle, mobile equipment or machinery across a TC Energy right-of-way outside the travelled portion of a highway or public road;
 - Using any explosives within 300 metres of TC Energy's right-of-way; and







- Use of TC Energy's Prescribed Area for storage purposes.
- 4. During construction of the site, temporary fencing must be erected and maintained along the limits of the right-of-way by the Owner(s) to prevent unauthorized access by heavy machinery. The fence erected must meet TC Energy's specifications concerning type, height and location. The Owner is responsible for ensuring proper maintenance of the temporary fencing for the duration of construction.
- 5. Permanent fencing may be required along the limits of TC Energy's right-of-way. The fence erected must meet TC Energy's and the municipality's specifications concerning type, location, and height. Any excavations for fence posts on, or within 30 metres of the pipeline must be done by hand or hydro vac. There shall be no augers operated on the right-of-way. The Owner shall notify TC Energy 3 business days prior to any excavation for fence posts located on or within 30 metres of the pipeline. All fences made of metallic materials must be approved by TC Energy prior to being erected on or within 30 metres of the pipeline.
- 6. Storage of materials and/or equipment on TC Energy's right-of-way is not permitted.
- 7. Planting and Vegetation Plans will minimize vegetation on TC Energy's right-of-way and ensure:
 - A 5 metre wide, continuous access way is provided on each side of the pipeline within the right-of-way;
 - TC Energy's right-of-way is seeded with Canada #1 seed;
 - No portion of a tree or shrub (including the canopy) at the time of maturity encroaches within 5 metres of the edge of TC Energy's facilities;
 - No trees or shrubs that will reach a height greater than 4 metres are planted within the right-of-way;
 - Tree roots do not interfere with or cause damage to the pipeline.
 - A minimum 10 metre separation is established between all groups of trees/shrubs. A
 group may consist of no more than 5 trees/shrubs; and
 - Where high-pressure gas is contained within an enclosed building (such as a metre station or building housing a compressor plant), trees and shrubs should be separated from the building by a minimum of 30 metres.
- Sidewalks/Pathways may be permitted within the right-of-way but must:
 - Not exceed 3 metres in width;
 - Maintain a minimum separation of 5 metres from the edge of the facility at all points where the pathway travels along the same direction (i.e. paralleling) as the facility within the right-of-way;
 - Cross TC Energy's pipeline as close to 90 degrees as possible, but no less than 45 degrees;
 - Limit crossings to 1 per city block (approx. 200 metres)







- Use company supplied signage for crossings installed by a Third Party; and
- Have expansion joints installed 3 metres on either side of TC Energy's pipeline(s) if the pathway is cement or asphalt.
- 9. Original depth of cover over the pipelines within TC Energy's right-of-way shall be restored after construction. This depth of cover over the pipelines shall not be compromised due to rutting, erosion or other means.
- 10. Facilities shall be constructed to ensure drainage is directed away from the right-of-way so that erosion that would adversely affect the depth of cover over the pipelines does not occur. Catchment basins, drainage swales or berms are not permitted within TC Energy's right-of-way. All infrastructure associated with site servicing, grading, and stormwater management (e.g. subdrains, manholes, catchbasins, retention walls, storm ponds, culverts/riprap) shall be setback a minimum of 7 metres from the edge of TC Energy's right-of-way or 7 metres from the pipeline, whichever is greater.
- 11. Should pooling of water or erosion occur on the right-of-way as a result of any facility installation or landscaping, the Owner will be responsible for the remediation to TC Energy's satisfaction.
- 12. Any large scale excavation adjacent to the right-of-way, which is deeper than the bottom of the pipe, must incorporate an appropriate setback from TC Energy's right-of-way and must maintain a slope of 3:1 away from the edge of the right-of-way.
- 13. Mechanical excavation within 1.5 metres of the edge of TC Energy's pipeline is prohibited. Hand or hydrovac excavation must be utilized within this distance.
- 14. In no event shall TC Energy be held liable to the Owner respecting any loss of or damage to the Owner's Facility which the Owner may suffer or incur as a result of the operations of TC Energy. The Owner shall be responsible for all costs involved in replacing the Owner's Facility damaged or removed during TC Energy's operations and shall indemnify and save harmless TC Energy from all actions, proceedings, claims, demands and costs brought against or incurred by TC Energy as a result of the presence of or damage to the Owner's Facility on the TC Energy right-of-way.
- 15. Vehicle barriers, of a design acceptable to TC Energy or as may be required by law, shall be installed across the width of the right-of-way, where public roads cross the right-of-way. The location of these barriers must be approved by TC Energy.
- 16. In new subdivisions, all display plans in the lot/home sales office shall identify the TC Energy pipeline right-of-way corridor.

- 17. Owners of properties on which TC Energy's right of way exists or abuts shall include notice of the following in all offers of purchase and sale:
 - Notice of the easement agreement registered against the property which may affect development activities on the property;
 - Notice of the 30 metre Prescribed Area as regulated by the CER Act;
 - The number of high-pressure natural gas pipelines within the easement and the location of the easement in relation to the development;
 - The setback for all permanent structures and excavations from the limits of the right-of-way; and,
 - The local One Call number 1-800-242-3447 or www.clickbeforeyoudig.com.
- 18. TC Energy's prior approval must be obtained for the Site Plans for the permanent structures to be erected on lots and/or Blocks which are encumbered by, or are adjacent to TC Energy's right-of-way.
- 19. In the event that TC Energy's pipelines experience contact damage or other damage as a result of construction, stop work immediately and notify TC Energy at once.
- 20. All associated work, signage or any other engineering protection measures must be completed by TC Energy or its qualified contractors at the sole expense of the Owner. The complete scope of work that may be required is subject to other conditions that may be necessary related to a finalized design that is approved by TC Energy. Additionally, prior to TC Energy or its contractors conducting any associated work, TC Energy and the Owner must execute a reimbursement agreement, including financial assurances, which provides that the entire cost of conducting this associated work is 100% reimbursable to TC Energy.

The owner shall ensure through all contracts entered into, that all contractors and subcontractors are aware of and observe the foregoing terms and conditions.

Conclusion

Please continue to keep us informed about this project and any future policy, land use, subdivision, and development activities in proximity to TC's pipelines and facilities. 









To Whom It May Concern,

WSP has been retained and is acting on behalf of Canadian National Railway Company (CN). We are pleased to have this opportunity to provide comments on the County of Minburn Municipal Development Plan. Our comments focus on policies and/or infrastructure initiatives, as they are related to existing and/or future CN facilities, operations and infrastructure.

It is our opinion, supported by the Provincial Policy Statement, 2020 (PPS) and the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks' (MECP) D-6 Compatibility between Industrial Facilities Guidelines (D-6 Guidelines), that planning for land uses in the vicinity of *rail facilities* be undertaken in such a way that the economic function and long-term operation of rail systems is protected. Provincial policy sets out that sensitive land uses be appropriately designed, buffered and/or separated from rail facilities, and avoid, mitigate or minimize negative impacts on and from railway corridors.

It is our position that the County of Minburn should incorporate policies that reflect the provincial policies and guidelines related to rail facilities. It is our position that the County of Minburn Winnipeg should provide direction within policy documents to ensure a consistent approach to their implementation across municipalities.

About CN, Railway Noise and other Adverse Effects

CN is a federally regulated railway company, and is governed by various federal legislation, including the *Canada Transportation Act* (CTA) and the *Railway Safety Act* (RSA), among others. The CTA requires federally regulated railway companies to only make such noise and vibration as is reasonable. The test of reasonableness under the CTA takes into consideration the railway company's operational requirements and its level of service obligations under the Act, as well as the area where the construction or operation takes place. The Canadian Transportation Agency (Agency) is the federal body that assesses the reasonableness of

noise associated with the construction or operation of a federal railway company. In its decisions, the Agency has concluded that municipalities have a responsibility to assess compatibility issues before approving housing developments in proximity to railway rights-of-way. The CTA also commented that where a municipality approves the development, it has a responsibility to ensure that the necessary mitigation measures are implemented. One example of such a decision is Decision No. 69-R-2014, dated February 27, 2014.

It is important to understand that there is no specific decibel limit contained in federal guidelines related to the construction or operation of rail facilities. Those federal guidelines clearly state that, while the Agency may take provincial and municipal noise and vibration guidelines into account in its deliberations, the Agency is not bound by those guidelines.

Preliminary Comments and Concerns

CN requests that the following policies be included in the municipal land use planning policy documents:

1. General Acknowledgement

The Region/City/County/Town and Council acknowledge the importance of rail infrastructure and recognizes its critical role in long-term economic growth and the efficient and effective movement of goods and people.

Development in proximity to rail facilities shall be developed in accordance with the Guidelines for New Development in Proximity to Railway Operations prepared by the Federation of Canadian Municipalities and the Railway Association of Canada (FCM/RAC Guidelines).

Include a definition for Major Facilities, Major Goods Movement Facilities and Corridors, Rail Facilities and Sensitive Land Uses.

We request that the following definitions found in the PPS be included in the policy document:

Major Facilities: means facilities which may require separation from sensitive land uses, including but not limited to airports, manufacturing uses, transportation infrastructure and corridors, rail facilities, marine facilities, sewage treatment facilities, waste management systems, oil and gas pipelines, industries, energy generation facilities and transmission systems, and resource extraction activities.

Major Goods Movement Facilities and Corridors: means transportation facilities and corridors associated with the inter- and intra-provincial movement of goods. Examples



include: inter-modal facilities, ports, airports, rail facilities, truck terminals, freight corridors, freight facilities, and haul routes and primary transportation corridors used for the movement of goods. Approaches that are freight supportive may be recommended in guidelines developed by the Province or based on municipal approaches that achieve the same objectives.

Rail Facilities: means rail corridors, rail sidings, train stations, inter-modal facilities, rail yards and associated uses, including designated lands for future rail facilities.

Sensitive Land Uses: means buildings, amenity areas, or outdoor spaces where routine or normal activities occurring at reasonably expected times would experience one or more adverse effects from contaminant discharges generated by a nearby major facility. Sensitive land uses may be a part of the natural or built environment. Examples may include, but are not limited to: residences, day care centres, and educational and health facilities.

3. Identify Rail Facilities and Influence Areas

We recommend identifying rail facilities and the areas of influence for sensitive land uses (300 metres for a rail line, 1 km for a rail yard) in a schedule to each policy document.

4. Provincial Policy Statement Requirements

The policies proposed below are recommended to be included in policy documents to address requirements for developments in proximity to rail facilities:

- Sensitive land uses shall not be encouraged adjacent to, or in proximity to rail facilities;
- b) All developments in proximity to rail facilities shall be developed in accordance with the FCM/RAC Guidelines:
- c) All proposed residential developments or other sensitive uses located within 300 metres of a railway right-of-way be required to undertake noise studies, to the satisfaction of the Municipality, in consultation with the appropriate railway operator, and shall undertake to implement the appropriate measures to mitigate any adverse effects from noise that were identified in the report and as may be required by CN;
- d) All proposed residential developments or other sensitive uses located within 75 metres of a railway right-of-way be required to undertake vibration studies, to the satisfaction of the Municipality, in consultation with the appropriate railway operator, and shall undertake to implement the appropriate measures to mitigate any adverse effects from vibration that were identified in the report, and as may be required by CN;
- e) All proposed building setbacks shall be in accordance with the FCM/RAC Guidelines. As a general guideline, buildings shall be setback 30 metres with



an appropriate berm abutting the rail right-of-way. Reduced setbacks can be considered in certain circumstances dependant on the proposed use and in conjunction with additional studies and alternative safety measures, to the satisfaction of the Municipality, in consultation with the appropriate railway operator;

- f) All proposed residential developments or other sensitive uses located adjacent to railways shall implement appropriate mitigation measures, including but not limited to, safety setbacks, berms, crash barriers and security fencing, in accordance with the FCM/RAC Guidelines;
- g) All proposed residential developments or other sensitive uses located adjacent to railways shall implement the applicable warning clauses provided by the appropriate railway operator;
- h) All proposed residential developments or other sensitive uses located adjacent to railways shall implement, secure and maintain any required rail noise, vibration, and safety impact mitigation measures, along with any required notices on title, such as development agreements, warning clauses and/or environmental easements, through appropriate legal mechanisms, to the satisfaction of the Municipality and the appropriate railway operator; and,
- All proposed residential developments or other sensitive uses located in proximity to rail facilities shall evaluate, prioritize and secure grade separation of railways and major roads, in co-operation with Transport Canada and the appropriate railway operator;

Conclusion

Thank you for sharing the draft. Looks like a lot of work was put into adding new content and restructuring for fit with other plans. Great to see.

I appreciate the new references in the agriculture and environment sections:

- 3.1 Agriculture and Rural Residential Land
 - To minimize the negative impacts of agricultural activities by encouraging good stewardship of the land.
- Advocacy Measures
 - 3.11.22 The County should explore how the protection of and restoring wetlands can contribute to the protection of County's roadways, bridges, recreation spaces as well as storm and wastewater facilities.
 - 3.11.23 The County shall continue to work with Ducks Unlimited Canada and other local organizations and continue to educate citizens about the benefits of wetland preservation.

One possible addition is to add specificity to help direct future efforts. In particular, under the objectives in 3.7:

• To ensure there is no further net loss of wetlands and to increase the number and areal extent of wetlands.

The Alberta Wetland Policy can assist the County in achieving this target as can Ducks Unlimited Canada. Doing so will help achieve other listed goals such as goal 1 and 8 under Section 1.4 of the draft. Some background on why:

Wetlands, perennial grasslands and boreal forest are essential Natural Green Infrastructure (NGI) that provides multiple benefits to society in a very cost effective and sustainable manner. These benefits, known as Ecosystem Services (ES), include flood and drought mitigation, water quality improvement, carbon sequestration, groundwater recharge, biodiversity, and cultural and recreational use. Investments in NGI have been proven to provide a high return on investment (ROI). These benefits are being increasingly recognized and incorporated into government and industry priorities at all levels.

The role of NGI in mitigating climate change is particularly relevant to Alberta. Wetlands defend Alberta's communities against extreme weather and so protect our way of life. Wetlands collectively store substantial volumes of water, buffering against drought and protecting (infrastructure) against floods. Called the kidneys of nature, wetlands also safeguard a clean, reliable water supply. This is of paramount importance, as water continues to be contaminated by runoff from urban centres, agriculture and a range of industrial activities. In addition, wetlands provide crucial habitat for wildlife, playing a key role in preserving and enhancing biodiversity.

Thanks again and happy to think along on further drafts or present on any of my input throughout the approval process if you think it could be helpful.

Hello Davin & Dnyanesh,

It was nice to meet you last week including learning more about snow geese. I promised to send you some examples of vision & objectives that could be considered as part of Minburn's updated MDP which is attached. I included the most relevant portions of the reference MDPs but they contain more wording in their MDP regarding wetlands and other natural areas that may be of value in your process than is included in the document.

A few additional observations:

- Generally, a wetland vision creates a roadmap for future decision making and can also support other county objectives (e.g. biodiversity, recreational areas). Corresponding wetland/environmentally sensitive area objectives formulated SMARTly may target improvements in processes or the number and value of wetlands. Objectives can also identify priority areas which include wetlands for further management. I see that you have included questions surrounding environmental policies in your survey. Hopefully, responses to this question provide you input to move forward on these policies including wetlands.
 - A way to work on implementation of the existing objective relating to wetland inventory is to detail that the County will explore how protection of and restoring wetlands can contribute to protection of Minburn's roadways, bridges, recreation spaces as well as storm and wastewater facilities. More on this can be found on the <u>Ducks Unlimited website</u>. In addition, the Vermilion River Watershed Alliance may be able to point you to potential existing wetland data sets for your area. A slightly older drained wetland inventory does exist for your area I believe. If you are interested I can connect you with our GIS specialist.
- The wording in the County of Minburn's current MDP could be strengthened in some parts (e.g. 3.10.12) where it mentions the County *shall prefer* to wording such as Wheatland where it says *the County shall require*. This may provide the County with more room to, for example, require developers to submit plans or do testing related to environmentally sensitive areas including wetlands.
- I note there are four mentions of setbacks in your current MDP but not all provide detail on how these are determined. Perhaps it is worth mentioning that setbacks are determined by certain standards such as the Ministries 'Stepping back from the water guide' or the Riparian Setback Matrix Model as developed by Lac La Biche County and used in their MDP.
- As many wetlands are located on agricultural land and there is continued drainage of those wetlands it is worth considering how wording related to agriculture can be changed to reflect this. A couple of examples:
 - O Vision on agriculture and environment:
 - Wheatland County MDP 3.1 Agriculture is the economic backbone of Wheatland County, and as the County's name suggests, our roots are in the agriculture industry. To this day, agricultural use remains the single largest land use within the County, and includes farms involved in grain production and livestock, and other agri-related businesses. These uses vary in their intensity and effect on the land, and although agricultural practices are essential to the County's economic sustainability, they are a change to the natural state of the land, and therefore the County recognizes the importance of environmental considerations in Agricultural Development as equally as in any development type.
 - Corresponding policy/objective:
 - Beaver County MDP 1.0 (e) To minimize the negative impacts of agricultural activities by encouraging good stewardship of the land.
 - City of St. Albert MDP 6.3.8. Promote land and environmental stewardship by supporting existing provincial legislation and policy related to agriculture.
- Lastly, given a focus of the MDP review is promoting residential growth and acreage subdivisions this
 provides an opportunity to include additional protections provided for by the MGA during the subdivision
 process to protect environmentally sensitive areas. The Environmental Law Centre can provide additional
 information on this subject.

Happy to provide more information or think along if needed! In addition, if we can engage with Council on a specific item or angle feel free to let me know. I am in contact with Kevin Bentley through the Vermilion River Watershed Alliance Board.

Taxation & Assessment Update

- Tax Notification list submitted to land titles.

- A couple property owners have since come in and paid and were removed from the list.

- No payments or agreements were signed from property owners scheduled to be in the 2023 tax sale.

Finance & Administration Update

- Statement of Funding & Expenditures (SFE's) have been submitted to the Province for the MSI, CCBF and ACP grants and Administration is in the final stages of the FCSS grant reporting which is due April 30th.
- The more notable changes on the Statement of Financial Position in March include:
 - A decrease of \$1.4M in cash/temporary investments to reflect the cost of ongoing operations and payment of requisitions
 - Decrease in long term receivables to reflect the invoicing of Grains Connect for their second installment required under their Developer's Agreement (Increased Trade Receivable).
 - On the liability side, the decrease in deferred revenue is tied to the returning of unused ACP grant funds (\$36k) related to the Emergency Services study that occurred in 2021/2022 to the Province.
- Significant revenue & expenses for March include:
 - \$42k of earned investment interest related to the maturity of a March 2022 GIC
 - Q1 Education requisition (\$619k)
 - GIS/AVL Contract (\$97k)
 - Bridge Maintenance Contract (\$79k)

- The fuel expenditure budget continues to be trending lower compared to 2022 with a positive year over year variance of approx. \$40k. Utilities are trending in the opposite direction as utility related expenditures are about \$10k higher than at the same point in 2022.
- The Decision Paper reporting chart reflects the status and progress of projects, purchases and initiatives that were approved as part of the 2023 budget. There were a number of changes in terms of progress with some items purchased being received and tenders being awarded.
- The Quarter 1 Investment Summary highlights both the investment income received as well as the interest that has been accrued to date. These amounts total \$267k which represents about 50% of the annual budget. Going forward, with the Bank of Canada interest rates hikes stalling, progress on the capital program continuing and the planned acquisition of land and aggregate, the cash levels of the County will drop considerably in the coming months and so will its ability to earn interest at the same pace. Despite the upcoming cash drain, the budget figure remains attainable.







Unpaid Oil and Gas Property Tax Update

RMA's latest unpaid oil and gas tax member survey has been completed and members currently face \$268 million in unpaid property taxes. After the release of the survey results, a Ministerial Order was issued by the Minister of Energy, Hon. Pete Guthrie, and the AER will now require proof of full payment of municipal property taxes prior to issuing a new license to a company or allowing a company to sell or purchase existing licenses. While RMA is optimistic that the Ministerial Order will lead to progress on the unpaid tax issue, outstanding questions still remain, including how the tax amount threshold referenced in the Ministerial Order will be determined, and how companies that are not in a position to transfer licenses will be held accountable.

The RMA is also encouraged by the requirement for the AER to work directly with the RMA and rural municipalities to gather unpaid tax data and update it on a regular basis. While the AER previously had the option of considering property tax payment status when assessing a company's risk, it had continuously refused to work with municipalities to gather that data, instead relying on companies to self-report their property tax payment performance, and ignoring the RMA's requests for information on if and how the regulator actually gathered or used property tax payment data. The RMA is looking forward to developing an approach to support the ongoing sharing of property tax data between municipalities and the regulator.

Advocating for a Municipal Role in Quasi-Judicial Approvals

Rural municipalities have faced ongoing challenges in having their voices heard and their land use plans considered by provincially-formed quasi-judicial bodies such as the AUC, AER and NRCB. While the major current challenge in much of the province relates to renewable energy development, there is a larger fundamental issue at play related to the need for the provincial regulatory bodies to better understand and acknowledge the role of municipalities in acting in the public interest as it relates to land use planning and development.

RMA is now accepting applications for the member committee on Quasi-Judicial Agencies. The committee will be comprised of five elected officials from RMA member municipalities and will be chaired by a member of the RMA Board of Directors. Due to high interest, the RMA is requesting that only on individual per municipality put their name forward for consideration. Please apply by April 14, 2023.

LGFF Update

In spring 2022, Municipal Affairs requested that RMA and ABmunis work together to develop an allocation formula for the Local Government Fiscal Framework, which will replace the current Municipal Sustainability Initiative in the 2024-25 fiscal year. After several months of negotiations, the two associations were unable to agree on a formula. RMA submitted a formula in September 2023 and ABmunis submitted a formula several months later.

Recently, the Minister of Municipal Affairs has reconvened discussions with RMA and ABmunis to seek a final formula that meets the needs of each association. The Minister has established some components that will be included in the formula, but is committed to working with both associations on the formula details, including weighting of individual components.

The Minister has set a goal of summer 2023 to determine a final formula. While a new formula may have significant allocation impacts for some municipalities, the Government of Alberta has committed to providing

transition funding to municipalities that will receive a lower amount than previously due to the formula. This will provide municipalities with an additional year to prepare for the impacts of the new formula.

RMA will provide members with updates on the formula development process when new information becomes available.

Spring 2023 Resolution Update

Resolutions form an important part in identifying direction for the RMA's advocacy efforts. At the recent spring convention, the RMA membership endorsed a total of eighteen resolutions. These resolutions will be integrated into the RMA's advocacy efforts, and progress will be communicated back to the membership as developments become available. The endorsed resolutions can be viewed on the RMA Resolutions Database, or the complete package of the endorsed resolutions can be viewed here.

Resolution Highlight – 2-22S: Negative Impact of Carbon Tax on Rural Albertans

To improve reporting on resolutions, RMA will highlight a different active resolution in each issue of the monthly district update. This issue highlights resolution 2-22S: Negative Impact of Carbon Tax on Rural Albertans. 2-22S directs RMA to conduct a study to determine the effect of the federal government's carbon levy on rural Albertans and municipalities. RMA has engaged Nichols Applied Management to undertake this work. The study will be conducted in two phases, with an interim report on the municipal impacts expected to be released in the next few weeks, followed by an analysis in rural individuals and households later in the spring. To ensure that members are kept abreast of the developments, RMA will be organizing a webinar presentation where the initial findings of the study will be presented. Details of the report and webinar will be shared with members very soon.

Provincial Election Advocacy

With the provincial election approaching, RMA is continuing to develop its "Uniquely Rural" election advocacy campaign. The campaign will be based around six key themes:

- Adoption of a Rural Lens
- Municipal Funding
- Municipal Access to Property Tax Revenues
- Municipal Autonomy
- Rural Healthcare and Social Services
- Rural Internet

RMA will be releasing election advocacy materials in the coming months, including a member advocacy guide, candidate guide, key issues document, and election web hub.

Asset Management Training for Elected Officials

In collaboration with the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM), RMA, ABmunis and Infrastructure and Asset Management Alberta (IAMA) are providing a series of free educational cohorts and workshops to municipalities. These activities seek to build asset management capacity within municipalities. Registration for elected officials has been opened.

This one-day course will allow elected officials to peer into the asset management process and learn more about the benefits. Although the workshop is mainly focused on elected officials, CAOs are encouraged to attend as well to get a sense of the strategic side of asset management.

At a minimum, by the end of this workshop, elected officials will have achieved the following:

- Develop an understanding of the asset management process to support your work as an elected official.
- Connect with other elected officials and share asset management experiences.

Speeches and question periods were also hosted with the Minister of Municipal Affairs, Hon. Rebecca Schulz, and Premier Danielle Smith. 

Dear Chief Elected Official:

Joint use and planning agreements (JUPAs) between municipalities and school boards operating within municipal boundaries enable the integrated and long-term planning and use of school sites on municipal reserve, school reserve, and municipal and school reserve lands.

On June 10, 2020, Section 670.1 of the *Municipal Government Act* was proclaimed, setting the deadline for municipalities to complete these agreements with the applicable school boards by June 10, 2023.

The ministries of Municipal Affairs and Education have heard from municipalities and school boards about the challenges of meeting this deadline. My colleague, the Honourable Adriana LaGrange, Minister of Education, and I have agreed to extend the deadline for municipalities and school boards to June 10, 2025, to provide sufficient time to complete these agreements.

In addition to this extension granted as per Ministerial Order No. MSD:013/23, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs can provide additional supports to municipalities to assist with the development of these agreements. Re: Technology Update Required

The Northern Lights Library System (NLLS) conducted an on-site audit of all our current technology and as a result of the report, confirmed our 4 public computers and 3 staff computers are no longer covered by warranty and have passed the time and technology threshold set by NLLS. Thus, they are not able to continue safely supporting the ongoing technology, safety protocols, platforms etc. set out by NLLS.

NLLS are able to purchase six desktop computers for the Mannville Centennial Public Library for \$996.40 each. While the educational pricing that NLLS is able to obtain could result in a lower cost, we encourage the approval of a maximum spending price of \$7,500 to account for pricing fluctuations as a result of the current market.

There are four computers available for public use and three staff computer workstations. The library does not require an active library card or to be a resident of our community to utilize the equipment/ technology. Currently we have a wide variety of Village residents and County residents who use our library. The public workstations are used regularly to access government initiatives such as Employment Insurance reporting, MyHealth accounts, My Service Canada Accounts, exam invigilator (university exams taken in the library), email, translation services, print services, scanning, resumes, cover letter, checking online job banks, research and also a safe space for children to develop their computer skills. Computer services are vital in keeping our library services operational, as well as support our community needs. The requirement to keep them up-to-date and operational ensures the staff can operate efficiently and keep order for the library. Our computers ensure all patron/personal information,

communications services, online promotions and marketing tools, research, and collection development are maintained and stored at the highest safety levels and protocols.

It is the goal of the Mannville Library Board to replace up to all 7 computers as soon as funds allow and have commitment from the Village of Mannville with the hopes that the County of Minburn will also assist with the technology replacement.
